

What to expect

When hosting an event of this magnitude, it is inevitable that there will be some impacts to Brisbane including the following:

Public transport:

- Changes to public transport timetabling in the Brisbane CBD and South Bank should be expected. The re-routing of services and the early termination of services may cause delays and people should allow extra time for their proposed journey.
- Trains will run through, but not stop at South Brisbane Train Station from November 10 to last train on November 13. From November 14 – 16, trains will not travel through South Brisbane station, and alternative arrangements will be in place.
- Buses will run as normal up until 7pm on Thursday November 13, when sections of the busway will be closed. Movement of buses along the busway under the BCEC will be stopped on November 14, 15 and 16.

Changes to public transport routes and timetables will be communicated by Translink in the lead-up to the event.

Car parking:

- Changes to on-street parking arrangements, taxi ranks and bus stops should be expected in the week leading up to the Leaders' Summit.
- The car park in the BCEC will be closed in the lead-up to and during the G20 Summit. People should plan to use alternative car parks or take public transport.

Road / Lane closures:

Temporary road closures are required leading up to and during the Summit period, specifically in the Brisbane CBD, South Bank and routes to and from the airport. People should leave extra time ahead of their journey. The following impacts to traffic and transport in the declared area can be expected:

- Closures to Merivale, Grey, Glenelg and Melbourne streets directly around the BCEC leading up to and during the Summit.
- Delays to travel times associated with motorcade route declarations. Motorcade routes, including roads from the Brisbane airport and within the CBD and South Brisbane area, will be closed for the duration of motorcades and reopen at the conclusion of the motorcade, which in some cases may cause delays of up to an hour.
- Lane closures will occur around Leader's hotels during the Leaders' Summit.

Final traffic and transport impacts will be confirmed and communicated approximately six weeks prior to the G20 Leaders' Summit.

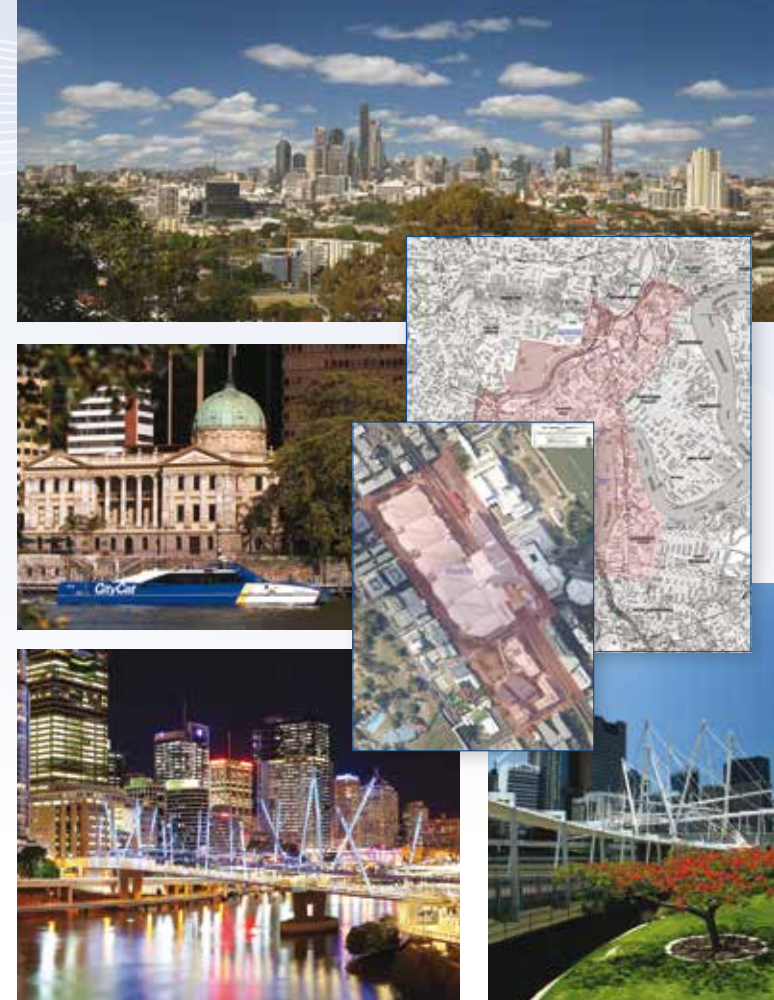

G20 Leaders' Summit 2014

Information for Brisbane residents and visitors



The Queensland Police Service (QPS) is working with the commonwealth, state and local government agencies along with a wide range of community members and businesses in the planning and execution of the G20 Leaders' Summit.

The G20 events in Australia are Commonwealth led, however the QPS is responsible for the security around the Queensland based G20 events.

The Leaders' Summit will attract 35 Internationally Protected Persons including 26 world leaders, around 4000 delegates and 3000 media representatives. During the Leaders' Summit, all eyes around the world will be on Brisbane.

Brisbane – open for business

Friday November 14 is a public holiday for the Brisbane Local Government area. The holiday is based on a person's place of work, rather than their place of residence, similar to the Exhibition public holiday. For a map of the Brisbane City Council area go to <http://www.ecq.qld.gov.au>

People are encouraged to go about their usual business during the long weekend of the Leaders' Summit, although you may have to go about your business in a different way. Businesses in South Bank and the CBD such as shopping precincts, entertainment venues, restaurants and licensed premises will still be open for business.

G20 safety and security

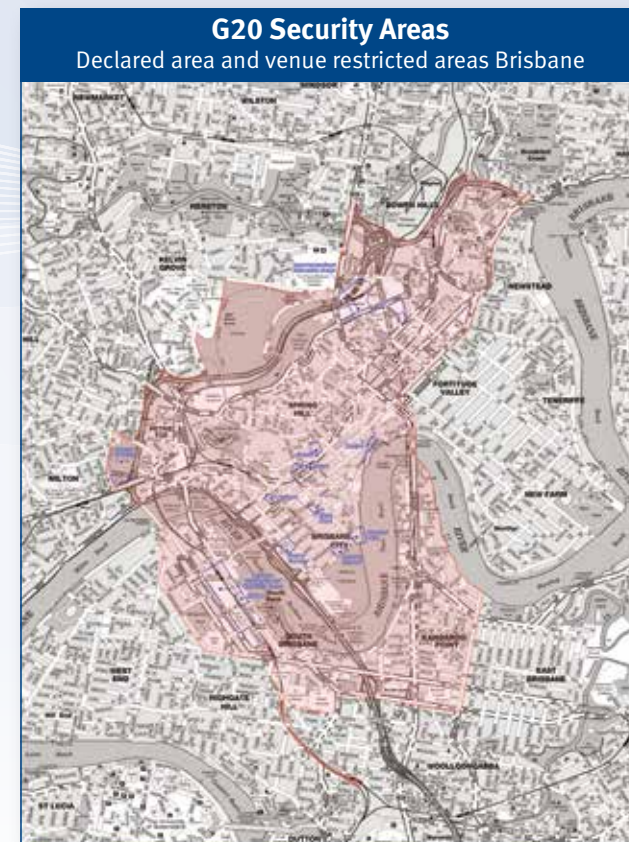
The *G20 (Safety and Security) Act 2013* (the G20 Act) was passed through the Queensland Parliament in October last year, and will provide police with some additional powers to effectively protect the dignity of the G20 meetings, as well as to provide a safe and secure environment for residents, members of the public, business owners and infrastructure within our community.

Under the G20 Act, there are areas that will be restricted for a set period of time. Authorised delegates, media and staff with appropriate Commonwealth accreditation will be the only people allowed access to a restricted area.

Some of these restricted areas include:

- The Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre (BCEC)
- The Royal National Association (RNA) Showgrounds
- Leader Accommodation Venues.

The declared area is the area directly buffering the restricted areas. It is an invisible barrier around event and accommodation venues. There will be no physical barriers around the declared area, and you will be able to go about your business within this area. Police will be periodically closing lanes and roads within the declared area to allow motorcades to travel between the Brisbane Airport and the accommodation and meeting venues. The QPS recommends that you allow extra time to travel within this area over the G20 Summit long weekend.
